From the Pastor's Desk

Lenten Reflections

This month brings to First & Franklin Presbyterian Church a rich table of events, including new members, warming weather, and the excitement of Easter Sunday. Along the way, we have enjoyed a season of Lenten study together. I want to share a few of the questions we discussed as a group.

Some context: We've been studying John 14-17, traditionally known as the "Farewell Discourse" – the lengthy, intimate, and pastoral "last conversation" Jesus has with his disciples before he is betrayed and crucified. Thirty-three years of Jesus' life is included from chapters 1-13 and 18-21, but this section of scripture includes just one late night talk with Jesus' closest followers.

With that in mind, our first evening began with this question: Whose sayings do you remember and why do you share them? Perhaps all of us remember something that a parent, close friend, or spouse said – and that comment or observation somehow captures much that we valued in the life that we shared together. Even though those sayings or stories included only a brief span of time, they assume a big place in our memory. This supplies a clue for how we might hear Jesus' farewell discourse – a word which is meant to sustain us long after that evening has passed into history.

Last Sunday evening, we reflected on this question: "How do human beings cope with absence?"

Our answers varied. Some recalled Elizabeth Kübler-Ross' five stages of grief – a means of structuring what otherwise might seem like an incomprehensible loss. Some of us talked about the way we share stories – these stories keep memories alive. But we also named something else: we are often reluctant to name the reality of separation, particularly with the death of a loved one. Those who are dying may actually wish to talk about death – those who are being left behind may struggle to allow that conversation.

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In this regard, John's Jesus – and again uniquely among the gospel stories – speaks candidly to our experience of the "absence" of Jesus, supporting us when we feel that he is not so easy to detect or feel.

In that vein, Jesus prepares his followers for the time when he will not be with them. He tells them that he will not "leave them as orphans" but will send the Spirit to abide with them. Of all the gospels, John devotes more space to the Spirit than any of the others. And the Spirit (or Advocate) for John carries on important functions in the life of the beloved community:

- As an abiding presence (14:16);
- As a teacher that continues the teaching of Jesus (14:26);
- Testifying to the truth of God's Word (15:26);
- Coming to the Disciples once labor of suffering is complete (16:7b-11);
- Sustaining the community in its future (16:12-15).

Speaking of the labor of suffering, Jesus compares the experience of his Passion to a woman who undergoes labor: "When a woman is in labor, she has pain, because her hour has come. But when her child is born, she no longer remembers the anguish because of the joy of having brought a human being into the world" (John 16:21).

Maybe this is a metaphor for our new birth in Christ, the labor pains which we have experienced over the Season of Lent. We've been in the desert with Jesus. We experienced a holy thirst. During Holy Week, we will remember Christ's suffering. In the sanctuary, on Good Friday, we will participate in a Tenebrae Service, literally, a "Service of Darkness" in which candles will be extinguished following each reading of scripture.

The service itself is incomplete. It ends in darkness. Technically, it's actually the longest of all services of worship, its "absence" of completion continuous until the Resurrection dawn. Perhaps there are parts of our lives that feel incomplete, interrupted – and we ache for the completion of joy. Remember: God will not leave us orphaned. Join us not only for Easter, but also for Holy Week, as we wait, sustained by the Spirit, for Christ's resurrection.

A NOTE ON SANCTUARY

As members of BUILD (Baltimoreans United In Leadership Development), First & Franklin is committed to a "radical tactic" – that is, "to meet people face-to-face and build relationships that help to re-knit the frayed social fabric of our life."

At its March 27th meeting, Session voted unanimously to support and encourage participation in the mission of the Sanctuary Coalition of Central Maryland (SCCM), a broad network of congregations, synagogues, mosques, and human rights organizations dedicated to advocacy for undocumented persons in the United States.

Session did not vote on becoming an official member of the Sanctuary Coalition, though it may do so in the future. Indeed, we are already part of the sanctuary movement. In February, our efforts helped one mother of four, Roxana, secure a temporary deferment; we are preparing to stand beside Veronica, who is also being targeted by ICE. We support the Coalition's mission, not just in word but also in action.

SCCM's is quoted below:

The Sanctuary Coalition of Central Maryland supports the concept of Sanctuary by promoting safety and refuge for those seeking safe and productive lives in the U.S. The Coalition proposes to support Sanctuary in the following ways:

- Prayerful support of Sanctuary congregations.
- Material support (including but not limited to food, meals, transportation and financial support) of those congregations offering Sanctuary to undocumented immigrants.
- Participate in phone banking gatherings to raise awareness
 of the Sanctuary movement, gather support of the movement,
 and seek material support as determined by each member
 institution, for Sanctuary congregations.
- Participate in advocacy initiatives to call upon Congress to submit legislation to support amnesty and immigration reform that will provide a pathway to legal status for the undocumented.
- Provide support, stand in solidarity with the National Sanctuary movement and seek ways to expand the Sanctuary Coalition.

- Explore the opportunity of civil resistance if it arises and call upon those who might be willing to participate.

 Membership in the Sanctuary Coalition will not include an expectation of participation in nonviolent civil resistance but will support those who choose to disobey civil law.
- Encourage support of the movement with electronic media posts, flyers, and banners supporting the human rights of immigrants and those living in Sanctuary situations.
- Contact, recruit, and publicize reduced cost/pro bono legal services for immigrants.
- Provide Know Your Rights information sessions, assist with plans of action and designation of temporary guardianship of minor children.
- Provide advocacy in counties with detention centers and locations where ICE raids are active.
- Organize candle vigils as an Ecumenical Sanctuary organization to help immigrants gain confidence and strength from God.

As a congregation, we are ramping up our commitment to the undocumented. From time to time, you will hear invitations to join actions which will bring us closer to each other in the love of Christ. Deportation actions are carried out in our city. Some of those actions are justifiable; but others are discriminatory and unjustifiable. Indeed, it is not so much that we have a "migrant crisis" but that we have a moral crisis. The movement of sanctuary, in its different forms, invites us to become collaborators with Christ and the undocumented as we work together for the alternative politics of God's peaceable rule. Prayerfully consider different ways in which you can support the sanctuary movement in Baltimore.


