## From the Pastor's Desk

### Summer Reading

Ironically, one of the things that I had to give up as an academic was leisurely reading – or more specifically, I struggled to read very much beyond my area of specialization. As a pastor, however, I'm grazing in more diverse intellectual pastures – and enjoying them! Here are a few books that I read this past year, not in any particular order . . . some of them found their way into my preaching, while others simply fed mind and soul.

Paul Kalanithi's *When Breath Becomes Air* (2016) continues to make it into my conversation whenever the talk turns to "good reads" – an understatement in this case. Kalanithi, an accomplished neuroscientist and student of literature, tells the story of his diagnosis with Stage IV lung cancer. He writes, too, from the perspective of his Christian faith. Kalanithi's book provokes a searching, at times heartbreaking reflection on what it means to be sick, what it means to die, and even more what it means to live. His closing words, which were penned to his daughter, an infant at the time of his death, still speak to me. If you haven't already done so, I recommend giving this book a couple of hours this summer – you will be more than compensated for your time.

Andrés Reséndez's work, *The Other Slavery: The Uncovered Story of Indian Enslavement in America* (2016) may not leap off the bookshelf, but if you give it a chance, it can add a critical "missing chapter" in the history of slavery in the Americas. Reséndez, who grew up in Mexico City and did his doctorate at the University of Chicago, asserts that slavery is not one thing, but actually many. Hence, the title of this book, the "other" slavery – he argues that enslavement of Native people in America was not identical with the enslavement of African Americans but it was related. Moreover, whether we see it in the global financial system or in the persistence of non-living wages in the United States, the phenomenon of slavery is not a one-dimensional, once-upon-a-time reality, but rather contemporaneous and many faceted. Reséndez's scholarly care in presenting his argument offers a needed and substantial corrective to the notion that slavery is a thing of the past.

On the fiction side, I can't help but mention Cormac McCarthy's *All the Pretty Horses* (1993). You may recognize some of his other titles, which have been turned into movies, such as *No Country for Old Men* and *The Road*. McCarthy's *All the Pretty Horses* is the first part of a trilogy. Perhaps I'll read the other two this summer. At times, McCarthy's writing almost levitates off the page, as if he had fallen under a spell of enchantment. He writes somewhere between heaven and hell – sometimes it's hard to tell which. Perhaps his work speaks to our age because his characters are so often caught up in the upheaval of tectonic shifts in culture and identity. They feel like pawns but, in other ways, they know they are "fearfully and wonderfully made" – and in that sense, McCarthy manages to speak to the human condition in more than merely dystopian tones. *All the Pretty Horses* explores themes of place, belonging, loss, myth, and a future which is not at all clear.

A few books for you to consider this summer – happy reading!

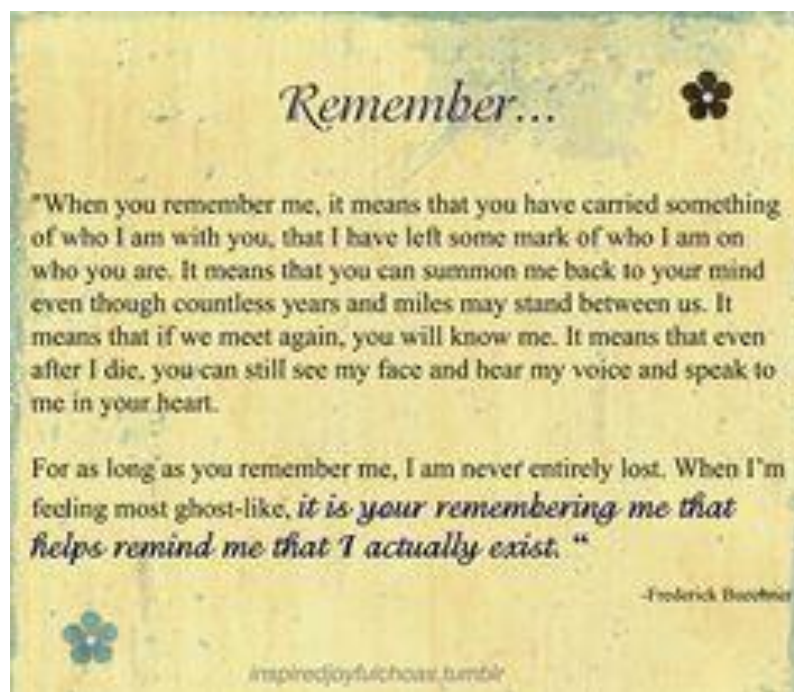

## PURPLE RIBBON PROJECT

First & Franklin's **Purple Ribbon Project**, which is organized by the Peacemaking Committee, is our prayerful and public response to the violence that afflicts our city. During our service of worship, we will name victims of homicide over the previous seven days. The list includes information about the victim, including his or her ethnicity. While everyone feels the impact of violence, the inclusion of the ethnicity of the victims reminds us all that to be a person of color in America is to be a person at unusual risk. One purple ribbon will be draped on the Park Avenue side of the sanctuary to remember each victim during the year. We hope that by hearing and seeing each victim's name, we will move their death beyond being just another number; that by seeing the ribbons we will better understand the magnitude of this problem; that the ribbons will awaken our hearts to the sorrow that has saturated our city; and that seeds will be planted to help us see and respond to the hurts of our city as Jesus has taught us.

### Project Description

St. Andrew's is collecting theological books for the Western Gambella Bethel Synod (WGBS) Jordan Bible School of the Mekane Yesus Church of Ethiopia (formerly the Presbyterian Church in Ethiopia). We invite other churches to join us in the collection, sorting, cataloging and packing of these books for shipment to Ethiopia. This could be a good project for church youth groups. St. Andrew's will purchase the necessary equipment and software to catalogue the books and provide proper boxes for shipping the books. When a church has accumulated a collection of books and is ready to catalogue the books and prepare them for shipping, a St. Andrew's member will bring the computer equipment and boxes to the church and supervise the process.

### Description of Books Being Collected

Classes at the Jordan Bible School are taught in English. In general the age of the book is not important as long as the book is in good shape. Both hard cover and paperback are acceptable. **In addition to the types of books listed below, many of the students also need a personal copy of the Bible in English.**

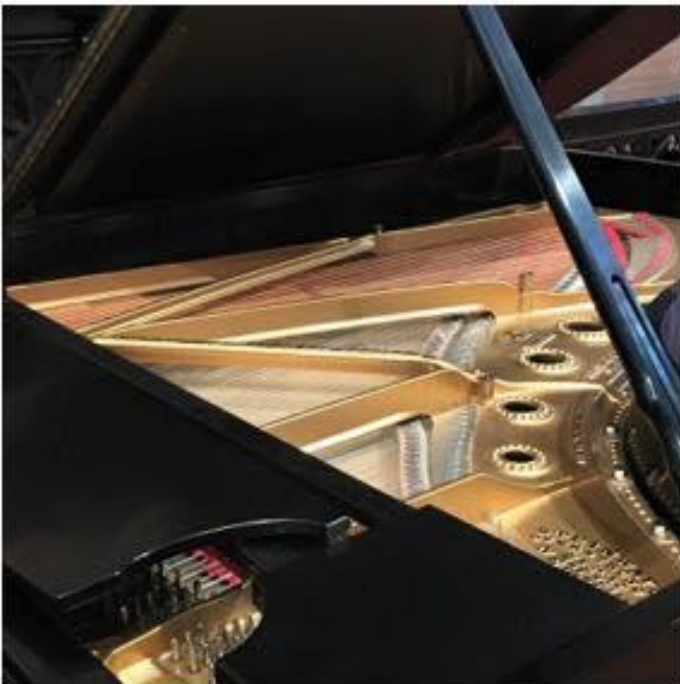
