
CALL TO CONFESSION



He lifted me when I was down.



CUBA DONATIONS NEEDED: Nusrat David, Matthew Davis, David Pierson, and Betty Schroll will travel to Taguasco, Cuba, on February 7 to spend a week with our sister church. We look forward to seeing old friends and meeting new members of their church, participating in their programs, sharing the challenges that our communities face, and enjoying each other's company. Resources are presently very low in Cuba. We will take down suitcases with much needed supplies. Donations, both monetary and in kind, will be greatly appreciated. Please bring in donations by Sunday, February 4. If you have an old suitcase that we could use to transport items and leave in Cuba, please let us know. Thank you for your generosity.

1. Medications

- Pain Relievers (Aspirin (81 mg), Ibuprofen, Acetaminophen, Motrin, Excedrin) All medicine must be chewable or oral, No GUMMIES, they will not be allowed into the country.
- Multi-Vitamins, Children and Adults, Vitamins C, E, B (Complex), B6, B12, D3, Iron, Zinc
- Adult and children's Calcium with D3
- Anti-allergy medicines: meclizine, benadrilina (Benadryl), and others
- Skin ointments: triple antibiotics, triamcinolone, clobetasol, ketoconazole
- Glucosamine with chondroitin
- Antacids (alka seltzer, lansoprazole, picot salt)
- Antidiarrheals
- Rehydration salts
- Bengay or generic muscle rub
- Tums, Pepto-bismol (chewable)
- Bandaids
- Thermometers
- 2. Craft Materials (colors, colored paper, crayons, pencils, and others...)
- 3. Liturgical colored candles (green, white, red, and purple).
- 4. Liturgical cloths for the pulpit and communion table.
- 5. Rechargeable lamps for the blackouts in Cuba.
- 6. Laptops They use the laptops for their liturgies, music, and worship. Even a used laptop is a great blessing.
