


HOMECOMING PICNIC

A RECEPTION FOR ART UNDER THE SPIRE

Art Under the Spire is returning to First & Franklin! The first installation will be 25 watercolors by artist Scott Ponemone, which are being displayed in support of our Guns 2 Gardens program and the Gun Buy-back Event that took place on August 5th. The exhibition is divided by the Reid Chapel's three walls. One wall, the "Guns" of the exhibition, features seven paintings, each showing a gun-range target held aloft by a person's arms. The opposite wall displays eight paintings of vegetables or young animals, the "Gardens" of the exhibition. On the third wall are images of infants, who are the witnesses to this world of "Guns" and "Gardens." On September 17th, after worship, we will have a reception with Scott Ponemone and the congregation to celebrate this powerful collection of art.





THE 2023-2024 SPIRE SERIES BEGINS

On Sunday, October 1, at 3:00pm, the Spire Series at First & Franklin will host our first artist of the 2023-2024 season - the Josh Espinoza Trio! This past July 26th will mark my 14 anniversary as a member of First and Franklin Presbyterian Church and is now starting my 15th also being on the Sanctuary Choir in September of 2009. During the pandemic in 2020 we had church via Zoom in which the congregation were joining together to worship for the first time in this format, i was out of work then due to the pandemic for almost a year and a half after waiting for my then job at Days Inn hotel to either call or email me, but unfortunately it didn't happen, and on June 9th 2021 I was hired on the spot at Gertrude's @ the Baltimore Museum of Art based on my many years in the restaurant industry (38 years to be exact). Since that time I come to church on some Sundays, and they scheduled me on Sundays for Brunch which is fine by me and at least keeps me working, but I think about my church family every week, but not to fear, I do keep up with the services by watching them on their website or on their facebook page which is not the same as being their in person which reminds me of an old commercial for the telephone company with the phrase "Long Distance it's the next best thing to being there" are far as watching the services on Zoom. But the upside to this since being a Deacon in 2021 I have since day I in June of 2020 as one of the original volunteers of the Food Pantry originated from the Reid Chapel, now in the Backus House, as far as talking and getting to know the people in the Mt. Vernon Community my neighborhood of 35 years. That is the story in a nutshell.

FROM BALTIMORE TO SOUTH DAKOTA

July 22-29 a team from Baltimore Presbytery, in partnership with Dakota Presbytery, travelled to Sisseton, South Dakota to lead a "learning camp" for children. Becca and Steve Hollaway, Marla Holt, and J Hyph joined five other volunteers from Baltimore-area churches. We worked every day with pastors and lay leaders from Native Presbyterian Churches.

This was the first time a learning camp had been attempted in Sisseton in several years, and we were aware of some difficulties in the past. We were well-prepared with stories, art projects, science experiments, and games. I'd say the local churches were not as well-prepared to turn out their own children.

The first day of the camp we had zero children show up, but we had three Native teenage girls who initially came as helpers for the camp. We decided to go ahead with our plan for the day, but to treat the three teenagers as our "children." They were game to participate, enjoying science experiments, story time, outdoor recreation (too hot, though), Uno—and especially art. All three girls were really gifted in art. During the rotation and meal times, we were able to talk with local church folk about why the turnout was so low.

On the second day, three young girls attended, and stayed through the rest of the week. They were delightful and entered right into all activities. One of them was only four, though, and artcouldn't really follow games involving written words or numerals; that's something we'll take into account for next year. By this time, we had decided to carry on with the learning camp just as if we had a larger group and treat it as a "dress rehearsal" for the camp next summer. We had great fun with the six girls who attended, teens as well as children. [Continued]

The most enriching aspect of the week for us adults, though, was our deep interaction with adults from local Presbyterian churches who came to talk with us. We were moved by presentations by one woman who started a healing ministry for victims of sexual violence, and another by a woman who serves in the South Dakota legislature as a representative and advocates for Native concerns. A member of the Presbytery staff taught Dakota art and demonstrated traditional hoop dances. Some of the people who chatted with us long after meals had ended were Ph.D.'s, some were seminary grads or trained lay pastors, and some were there in the role of grandmother or volunteer cook. We learned an incredible amount about the culture and our not-always-sensitive response to it. We learned that the interaction between Native congregations is as complicated as any such relationships in Baltimore.

One of the highlights of the week was a huge potluck including Indian tacos, which doubled as a birthday party for a pastor's son turning one. All of us visitors from Baltimore were warmly welcomed and engaged in conversations.

We decided that one of the problems with attendance at the camp is a lack of transportation. The five participating churches are spread pretty far apart, and many people don't have cars available. There is essentially no public transportation. Our first option is to hire school bus drivers to pick up children; a second option is to recruit Native volunteers to drive vans that a Mennonite group leaves parked at the church where we had learning camp. I hope we can find ways to cultivate interest within the Native churches during the spring, and reassure them that although we are borrowing the building of a majority-White nondenominational church, this is a camp for Native children.

Every team member said at the end of the week that they were glad to be part of the experience. All agreed that we learned a lot which will help us carry out a camp in 2024.



A SUCCESSFUL GUN BUY-BACK

On Saturday, August 6, First & Franklin joined with the Archdiocese of Baltimore to hold a Gun Buy-Back event at the Edmondson Village Shopping Center. The cooperation between our two groups was energizing and helped to make this event a great success. The Archdiocese was able to provide staff, who were knowledgeable in media and community outreach, plus Father Murphy, who is a skilled fundraiser and who held a vision of sponsoring a community service fair simultaneously. We were able to offer our experience, connection with the police department, organization for the buyback, supplies, food for the police, and volunteers for the buyback. Hunting Ridge Presbyterian also joined the effort helping publicize to the neighborhood, garner support from local communities, and offer creative ideas.

By the time we opened, cars had circled around the parking lot and down Edmondson Avenue for blocks. A total of 356 guns were collected using all our funds- a total of \$60,500! The police will take all the guns to a foundry in Pennsylvania to be melted down. A special thank you to Corena and Bill Bridges, Judy Dadds, Allie Payne, Muddassar Iqbal, Jim Schroll, and Aaron Redsicker for volunteering on Saturday; to Ann Silberman, Steve Holloway, and Paula Crews for helping to plan the event; and to all who helped to finance the buyback.



MEDICINES NEEDED FOR CUBA

Several people from Baltimore Presbytery are traveling to Cuba for a business meeting with the El Centro Presbytery. We will be collecting donations of much needed medicines for them to bring and share with our partner churches. Requested medicines include ibuprofen, acetaminophen, multivitamins, anti-allergy meds, antacids, antibiotic ointments, and more. FOOD PANTRY REPORT

The Food Pantry only was at Backus House for 2 Saturdays of the month. There was no Food Pantry on August 5th due to the Gun Buy Back, and we continue to close on the last Saturday of each month. For the month of August, a total of 39 Grocery Bags and 81 Produce Bags were distributed to the neighbors within the Mt. Vernon Community. We had some new volunteers to help those who had been there from Day 1 in June of 2020. We have our regulars and also a couple of new people who had been spreading the word week after week that we are here for 2 hours on most Saturdays.





COFFEE HOUR VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Volunteers are needed to provide coffee hour refreshments on Sundays from October 1st through December 17th. Members with the last name A-D are encouraged to sign up. It only costs about \$10-15- enough to provide snacks for 20-25 people.
