WELCOME FALL, WELCOME SCHOOL, WELCOME CHURCH



Although some schools and colleges re-start before Labor Day, that weekend marks the end of summer for most of us. For my school-teacher parents, summer was time off, even when Dad took side jobs for a couple of months. In the summer, we vacationed at the same NY State Park for a week every year, saw relatives more, and had a wonderfully unstructured time.

It was the 1960's and our family of 5 boys was average size for the new suburbs going in, with lots of neighbor kids for playing games. This was also a time when diversity in the white middle class meant different European ethnicities, while tolerance or inclusion meant Jews and Catholics, and Protestants beginning to intermarry.

My Catholic-background father took his newly-married Presbyterianism seriously. Not only had he survived terrible wartime experiences, naming me "Christian" in gratitude, but my mother's brand of Protestantism was a new language to learn and a very different style of church.

He was welcomed, became an elder, got involved in the "Social Education and Action Committee," worked on "Fair Housing," and soon served on a PNC.

Though we were not regular attendees during the summer, we were every Sunday during the school year, and one of my parents usually taught Sunday School as well. As teachers, both of my parents prized perfect attendance—and unless you were really sick, you went in because otherwise, the whole routine would be thrown off. And commitment was something you showed by showing up. Hard to imagine how they would have dealt with Covid—as our young families have had to do in these past two-plus years.

My parents-built faith into their children's lives as much as education, and my 4 brothers and I are still in it (though 3 have strayed from the Presbyterian fold to Quaker, Episcopal, and non-denominational options). Religious bodies had more social support then, and entertainment options were fewer. You may have noticed that my mother was not mentioned until now—though her influence was very strong, she could not get back into the school system after not working while we all were young.

The church itself has changed, as well as family structure, and the society is far more unequal economically. So, it costs more in a number of ways to come to church today. It requires more intentionality; all of you who read this are probably aware you go against the grain. And we need to support each other more, pray for each other more, reach out and create new opportunities.



F&F AUGUST /SEPTEMBER HISTORICAL TIMELINE

DATE	HISTORICAL EVENT
8/1/1776	Dr. John Stevenson, original founder was elected as a representive to the Maryland Consitutional Convention. Loaned money to build the first church. Wealthy exporter of wheat and flour. Innoculated public against smallpox for free.
8/5/1777	General William Buchanan was named Commissary General of Purchases, United States Army. He represented Baltimore County in the second, third, and fifth Maryland conventions in 1774 and 1775 and served as commissary general of purchases for the Continental army in 1777 and 1778.
8/24/1814	Joshua Barney defe <mark>nds Washing</mark> ton against British in War of 1812. The Revolutionary Naval Commodore were severely wounded during the Battle of Bladensburg fighting British in hand-to-hand combat.
9/8/1781	First Mayor, James Calhoun meets George Washington in Baltimore. Future first mayor part of the reception committee to General Washington during Baltimore visit, September 8, 1781. The same year contributes to fund the Continental Army.
9/12/1777	Rev. Patrick Allison presses Congress to Print American Bibles. Printing of Bibles in America was forbidden. Patrick Allison presses Continental Congress on the matter. Finally Aitken's 1782 Bible printed with the approval of Congress.
9/12/1815	Rev. James Inglis speaks at Dedication of Battle Monument. The Revolutionary War Battle Monument was dedicated on Calvert ST.

F&F AUGUST /SEPTEMBER HISTORICAL TIMELINE CONTINUED

DATE	HISTORICAL EVENT
9/12/1746	Dr. William Lyon established first drug store in Baltimore. He loaned money to build the first church. Issued the first city health ordinance in 1750. "Whereas several persons permit stinking fish and dead creatures or carrion to lie on their lots, or in the street near their doors, which are a very offensive nuisance and contrary to Acts of Assembly, the Commissioners therefore order the clerk to put up advertisements to inform such persons that they are to remove the same."
9/12/1815	Rev. James Inglis speak <mark>s at Dedica</mark> tioon of Battle Monument. The Revolutionary War Battle Monument was dedicated on Calvert ST.
9/13/1874	The ceremony for Spire Completion was held on Sunday September 13, 1874. The total cost of construction for F&F including including sanctuary and spire: 250,000+.
9/13/1814	General David Poe, Edgar Alan Poe's Grandfather, fought in the Battle of Baltimore. Assistant Deputy Quartermaster in the Revolution and known to George Washington. Contributed \$40,000 to the war effort. At 71 he fought in the War of 1812 Battle of Baltimore.
9/14/1814	George Brown fought in the War of 1812. Brown joined his father in the family Finance business, Alex. Brown & Sons. Fought in the Battle of Hampstead Hill (now Patterson Park) Sept 12-13-14, 1814. In his will, he cancelled a \$25,000 mortgage of First Presbyterian Church in Baltimore
9/15/1763	Rev. Patrick Allison was elected as the First Pastor of First Presbyterian Church. In 1763, Patrick Allison, then age 23, accepted the group's invitation to lead the church in Baltimore. Annual Pay is 100 Pounds, Pennsylvania money
9/15/1786	The Western Burying Ground was acqquired by First Presbyterian Church. The Western Burying Ground of the Church contains 18 Revolutionary era Generals, James Calhoun (first Mayor of Baltimore), Edgar Allan Poe, and many leading citizens in commerce and industry
9/15/1835	Martin Van B <mark>uren, a founder of the democr</mark> atic party led the Democratic National Convention that was held at First Presbyterian. He was also a leader in the development of the two-party system .

A TIME TO MOURN

Rev. Chris Iosso, Interim Pastor

Frederick Buechner, an inspirational novelist and theologian, author of 39 books, died at 96 on August 15, 2022. A Presbyterian minister who never served as a pastor, his reach was ecumenical and capable of touching both "evangelical" and "mainline" readers. As a college student, I first read his coffee-table book, *Faces of Jesus* (1974), from which the quotation below this paragraph is taken. Steve Hollaway will be providing one of his best known quotations in the August 28 worship bulletin. His book, Wishful Thinking: *A Theological A,B,C.*, stands out as I look back-- I often gave that as a present. One of my cousins read all his books-- for some he was more contemporary than C.S. Lewis but could speak to one's inner experience of faith with similar effectiveness. Through a member of the Scarborough Presbyterian Church I was once able to meet him and part of his family-- he was wonderfully hospitable, showing me the converted barn-library where he wrote some of his books. For me he was part of a group of engaging Presbyterian writers: Patrick Henry, Kathleen Norris, Marilynne Robinson, Barrie Shepherd, and Robert McAfee Brown a bit earlier, who understood the late 20th and early 21st Century world and could see God in it. That's our world, and I recommend Buechner (pronounced, Beekner) and those other writers who have given me so much.

"In his own way, Paul would have perhaps understood this painting too, Paul as the only one who ever dared to speak of the foolishness of God, of the crucifixion itself as folly, of the folly of his own preaching. If the world is sane, then Jesus is mad as a a hatter and the Last Supper is the Mad Tea Party. The world says, Mind your own business, and Jesus says, There is no such thing as your own business. The world says, Follow the wisest course and be a success, and Jesus says, Follow me and be crucified. The world says, Drive carefully - the life you save may be your own - Jesus says, Whoever would save his life will lose it, and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it. The world says, Law and order, and Jesus says, Love. The world says, Get and Jesus says, Give. In terms of the world's sanity, Jesus is crazy as a coot, and anybody who thinks he can follow him without being a little crazy too is laboring less under a cross than under a delusion."




HAPPY RETIREMENT JUDGE PAM WHITE!



Bring your unwanted and UNLOADED guns to be dismantled and they will then be made into garden tools by blacksmiths through the RAWTools program. Our goal is to reduce the number of unwanted guns in homes and communities.
